Worship Reflection

All the ends of the earth shall remember and turn to the Lord; and all the families of the nations shall worship before him. For dominion belongs to the Lord, and he rules over the nations. (Psalm 22 v 27-28)

Prayer:

Gracious God, as we travel through Lent, help us not to walk unthinkingly through life, but to reflect on all we see and experience, and so recognise your hand at work. Amen

Bible Reading (Mark 8 v 31-38)

He then began to teach them that the Son of Man must suffer many things and be rejected by the elders, the chief priests and the teachers of the law, and that he must be killed and after three days rise again. He spoke plainly about this, and Peter took him aside and began to rebuke him. But when Jesus turned and looked at his disciples, he rebuked Peter. 'Get behind me, Satan!' he said. 'You do not have in mind the concerns of God, but merely human concerns.'

Then he called the crowd to him along with his disciples and said: 'Whoever wants to be my disciple must deny themselves and take up their cross and follow me. For whoever wants to save their life will lose it, but whoever loses their life for me and for the gospel will save it. What good is it for someone to gain the whole world, yet forfeit their soul? Or what can anyone give in exchange

for their soul? If anyone is ashamed of me and my words in this adulterous and sinful generation, the Son of Man will be ashamed of them when he comes in his Father's glory with the holy angels.'

Reflection



When I was Minister of the Methodist Church in Verwood in Dorset, the church was redeveloped to make it larger for the growing congregation. Some of the wood was taken by one of the church members and made into a number of beautifully crafted crosses. These crosses were constructed to a traditional design in

which the horizontal arms of the cross are made of two separate pieces of wood. These pieces represent the nails used to crucify Jesus.

In this week's Gospel reading, Jesus invites each one of us to take up our cross and follow him. This is, of course, challenging. However, during Lent we are reminded that when we respond to this invitation to discipleship, we are following in the footsteps of Jesus who walked in obedience

to his heavenly Father - it was the way that took him to the Good Friday Cross. His love for each one of us was, and is, without limit. Taking up our cross and following is not easy, but we do it following his example of sacrificial love and we walk daily in his strength.

This week let us pray especially:

- Those who work within the NHS and in care homes who continue to serve others despite being physically and emotionally drained.
- For parents, teachers and pupils as they prepare for the return to school of those who have been studying at home.
