Dear Friends.

This week we arrive not only at the Fourth Sunday of Lent, but also at Mothering Sunday.

The celebration of Mothering Sunday has a long and rich history. From as long ago as the 8th century, the Bible readings traditionally read at this 'mid-point' of Lent related to the idea of motherhood in terms of the Christian faith. This is particularly the case with the reading from Paul's letter to the Galatians which refers in chapter 4 v 26 to Jerusalem as 'our mother'.



This idea of referring to a spiritual home in terms of motherhood led later to Mothering Sunday becoming a day when people returned to their 'mother church'. This was perhaps the church where they were baptised, or the local cathedral. By the year 1644, those who followed this pattern were said to have gone 'mothering'. In later times, Mothering Sunday became a day when domestic servants were given a day off to visit their mother church, usually with their own mothers and other family members.

More recently, the day has increasingly focused on our human mothers and, in the midst of our celebration of the good aspects of family life, we must not forget those who live in fractured families separated from their mothers or those who have lost their own mothers over the last twelve months.

Clearly in our modern world we can easily get distracted by the commercialisation of such days, but, as we thank God for good and enriching family relationships, we are invited to remember the spiritual origins of Mothering Sunday and to thank God for our 'spiritual homes' and for those who have been part of our own faith journey.

O give thanks to the Lord, for he is good; for his steadfast love endures for ever. (Psalm 107 v 1)

Just as Moses lifted up the snake in the wilderness, so the Son of Man must be lifted up, that everyone who believes may have eternal life in him.'

For God so loved the world that he gave his one and only Son, that whoever believes in him shall not perish but have eternal life. For God did not send his Son into the world to condemn the world. but to save the world through him. Whoever believes in him is not condemned, but whoever does not believe stands condemned already because they have not believed in the name of God's one and only Son. This is the verdict: light has come into the world, but people loved darkness instead of light because their deeds were evil. Everyone who does evil hates the light and will not come into the light for fear that their deeds will be exposed. But whoever lives by the truth comes into the light, so that it may be seen plainly that what they have done has been done in the sight of God.


Reflection

This week's set Gospel reading contains the powerful verse, "For God so loved the world that he gave his one and only Son, that whoever believes in him shall not perish but have eternal life". (John 3 v 16). This verse proclaims the wonderful Good News that God:

- Loved the world
- Gave his Son
- Invited us all.

Each of those three statements is important and together they proclaim the message of grace which is at the very heart of the Christian faith.

The verse before those well known words is perhaps less familiar, but it is no less important, because its description of the 'Son of Man' being lifted up reminds us that when God 'Loved',



'Gave' and 'Invited' it was not without cost.

Jesus was lifted up on the cross of crucifixion so that evil could be defeated and God's love could be made available to all who would accept the message of the God who 'Loved' and 'Gave' and 'Invited'.
